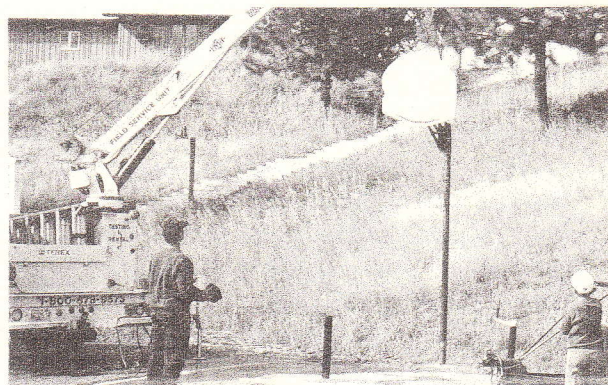

Let us give thanks to God for the seasons and for all the blessings He has given us.



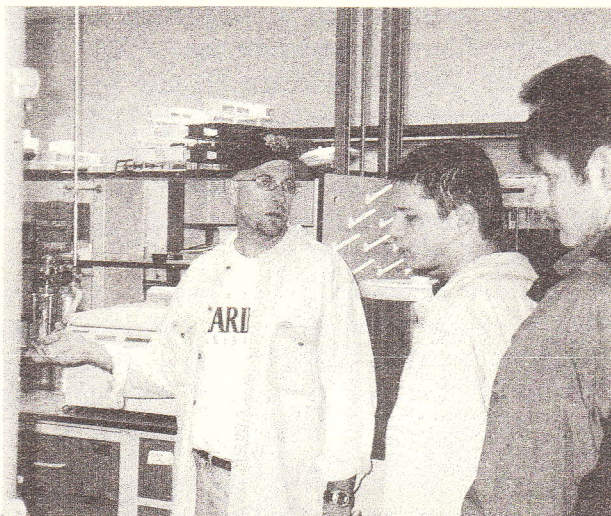

The Fifteen Promises of Mary to Christians who recite the Rosary

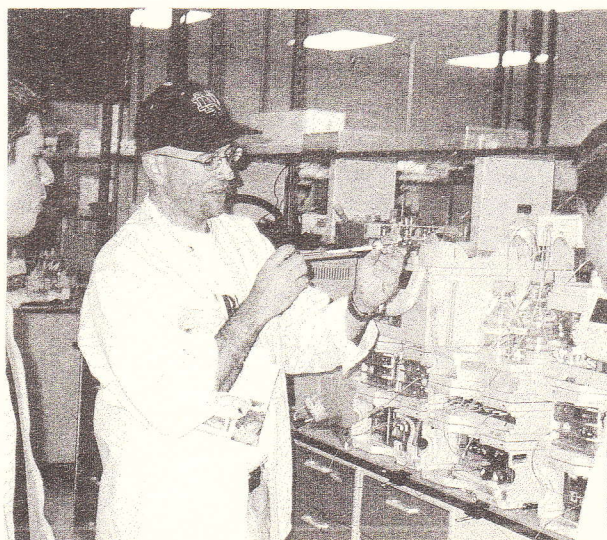
1. *Whoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the rosary, shall receive signal graces.*
2. *I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the rosary.*
3. *The rosary shall be a powerful armor against hell, it will destroy vice, decrease sin, and defeat heresies.*
4. *It will cause virtue and good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities, and will lift them to the desire of eternal things. Oh, that souls would sanctify themselves by this means.*
5. *The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the rosary, shall not perish.*
6. *Whoever shall recite the rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of the sacred mysteries shall never be conquered by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice, he shall not perish by an unproved death; if he be just he shall remain in the grace of God, and become worthy of eternal life.*
7. *Whoever shall have a true devotion for the rosary shall not die without the sacraments of the Church.*
8. *Those who are faithful to recite the rosary shall have during their life and at their death the light of God and the plentitude of His graces; at the moment of death they shall participate in the merits of the saints in paradise.*

Twenty-five Years

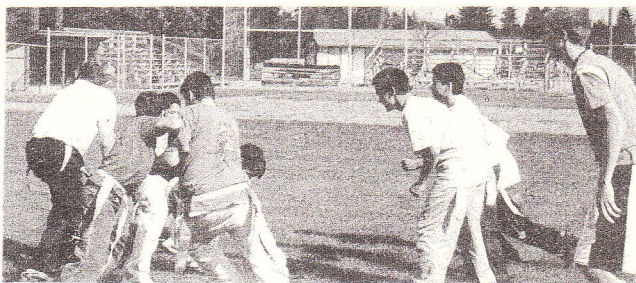

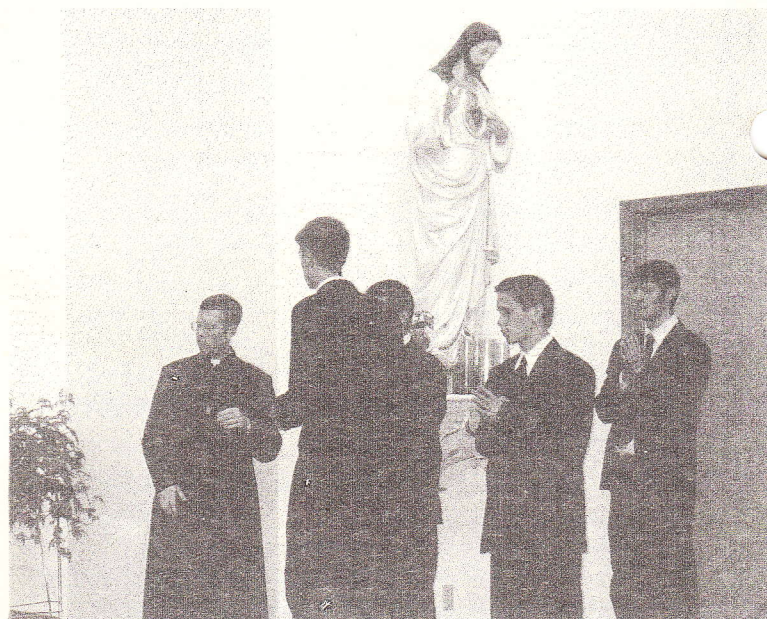
