Devout Catholic and Great Explorer

This coming 14^{th} of October is Columbus Day, the day to honor one of the first explorers of America. Though he was not the first person to discover America, he was the first to be widely known to leave a presence in the New World. Besides this day of commemoration of his name, many places are named for him, such as the District of Columbia; Columbus, Ohio; British Columbia; and many others.

With the great rise of liberalism today in our country, people are rejecting traditional teachings and embracing

anti-Christian concepts. There are efforts in many parts of the country to rename Columbus Day as Indigenous Peoples' Day. Many universities, even Catholic ones, and cities are attempting to take down the statues of this explorer who was a great man of faith; instead depicting him as an archetype of colonial wickedness. Though Columbus wasn't a saint, he nevertheless, was a very devout Catholic.

From the kingdom of Castile, Christopher Columbus made his first voyage to America in August, 1492, with the sponsorship of King Fedinand II and Queen Isabella I, monarchs of Spain. Many of his companions complained about the length of the voyage. With his great leadership Columbus encouraged them and told them to have faith in Our Lord and pray to Our Blessed Mother, and that she would protect them on this journey. He also ordered that the Salve Regina be sung every night by all the sailors.

With God's help, he arrived at the New World on the 12th of October. The first thing that this navigator did was to order the *Te Deum* to be chanted among his men, in order to give thanks to God who had saved them from the dangers of the ocean. He later made three more journeys to South and Central America, and different parts of the Caribbean, where he named different islands after the saints.

Despite his great work, many still criticize him for the colonization, which they claim led to enslaving and torturing the Native Americans. Although some European settlers oppressed the natives, Columbus forbade these lawless men to steal from the villages and forced them to free the Indians that they enslaved, insisting that they do no harm to the Indians.

His discoveries not only made way for the evangelization of Latin America, but also brought an end to cannibalism among the Caribs and the human sacrifices of

the Aztecs. Columbus' discoveries played an important role for the Church itself. A quarter of a century after his first voyages to America, Holy Mother the Church would face its greatest crisis of faith since the Arian heresy: the Protestant Reformation.

Columbus was indeed a man of great faith. He put his will entirely into the Hands of God. That's why he had conquered the ocean and discovered what is to be called the great America today. We should learn from this pious man to strive to have a great zeal of faith, and to pray to Our Blessed Mother that she will intercede for us to God, that He will save us from the perils of this life, that we may get to Heaven, our true home.

God's Great Gift of Music

Then comes a babble of many voices heard sounding through the house and testing the very walls' stability, as we warm up for our seventh and final period, choir.

This is a very important and satisfying subject taught by Father Philip Marie for the prospects of the priesthood, but more importantly it gives honor and glory to God and His Blessed Mother. A few examples of music we sing: the Salve Regina every night, a hymn after every Rosary, the chanting of Compline on Sundays and Vespers on feasts of Our Lady, and we are now practicing a High Mass for the feast of the North American Martyrs.

Though we are starting simply with the Mass of the Angels, our goal is to slowly and cautiously work up to more complicated Masses and hymns. For I believe that singing in a choir is more fun and satisfying than it is to listen to music.

From the beginning of the Catholic Church singing has performed a significant part of the Church's history. In the beginning of Church music, we find traces of Jewish traditions and the Ambrosian chant which were passed down by manner of mouth and teaching. It wasn't until the monk Guido in the 11th century established the staff and the notes of the major scale that music could be copied and understood by any that read it. The next great addition to Church music was by Giovanni Palestrina, who is known as the prince of music. He introduced a new style of singing in four or more parts (polyphony) that completely changed forever the realm of music.

Sadly, good music has unfortunately greatly digressed since the mid-twentieth century. Unfortunately, people do not understand the benefits of singing good music in a parish choir. To quote Saint Augustine: "Singing is praying twice;" and to quote another commentator: "Those who have a good singing voice and neglect to use it are like those who, receiving a talent, bury it." If this were not already enough reason to sing in a choir, after the servers the choir members receive the most amount of grace during Mass. What more needs to be said?

How truly beautiful it is to chant every Sunday the Salve Regina in procession with lighted candles, wending our way in the darkened chapel singing only for God's greater glory. I encourage all those with a musical talent to put your talent to good use and not bury it, but especially those with a religious calling. For singing for God is one of the best ways to honor Him.
