Dear Friends and Benefactors of the Seminary,

With the close of the school year, we have now settled into our summer routine. That means a more-relaxed daily schedule, but there still is a daily schedule. As priests and religious, it is very important for us to follow a daily routine, regardless of the time of year.

Here at the seminary for the summer there are two priests (Fr. Augustine and myself) and one cleric (Frater M. Aloysius, CMRI).
